



We would love you to join us for a fantastic and inspiring day out!

From garden and nature lovers and historic buffs to those who simply want a slice of the best homemade Victoria sponge, we have something for everyone of all ages. And for the kids, it's time to hone your treasure hunting skills, welly boot throwing, and putty golf.

Our home, West Lavington Manor, is surrounded by five acres of walled garden, originally designed by Sir John Danvers in the 17th century. Besides being an inspirational garden designer (he brought the Italianate garden to the UK), Danvers was a politician and one of the signatories to the death warrant of Charles 1.

Over the last 15 years the garden has been restored with new features every year. There are hidden gems throughout, including the marriage crest of Danvers, and a Roman Torso, dating back from Danvers times. Unique aspects include: our Japanese Garden, a birch grove, an orchard with 25 different species of apples and pears, glorious herbaceous borders, a lake with duck house, a chess garden and rose garden.

There will be entertainment, local produce for sale (including apple juice from our orchard and homemade marmalade from Mallorca), an amazing refreshments marquee (worth the visit alone), with delicious cakes, scones, quiches, and of course the famous O'Pork Pulled Pork on the BBQ, all washed down with a refreshing Pimms, wine, prosecco. Or join us with your own picnic and bring your dog on a lead.

With the Middle East wars now prominent in world news, Foreign Secretaries come to mind. Many of us will remember the now famous quote of Sir Edward Grey (Foreign Secretary 1905-1916) in August 1914 at the pending outbreak of the Great War. Having explained cogently in Parliament why Great Britain had

to go to war with Germany, he returned to the Foreign Office. At dusk he could see from his desk the lamp man igniting the lamps in St James's Park. He remarked to his secretary 'The lamps are going out all over Europe, we shall not see them lit again in our lifetime'.

Sir Edward was also possibly the first British politician to establish the 'special relationship' with the United States, thanks to a walk in the New Forest in 1910 with visiting US President Theodore Roosevelt, who was also a keen bird lover. On the walk, Roosevelt recognised the song of the Gold Crested Wren, our smallest bird, and also a resident in the US!


As well as holding a high State office, Sir Edward was a countryman at heart, a great lover of nature and an eminent ornithologist. He was one of the founders of the British Trust for Ornithology,

created in 1932 to further the study of British birds. He studied robins when up at Oxford, and stone curlews on the family estate in Northumberland, and whilst Foreign Secretary he meticulously studied the flora and fauna of St James's Park. In 1927, he published a book on his love for birds (The Charm of Birds).

So what is our connection with Grey, the Foreign Secretary of 110 years ago, when Great Britain was at the height of her industrial power, the world's population was billions less than now and global warming would have appeared gobbledegookish? Why, robins! Some residents have noticed a decline in the number of these iconic birds over the recent winter of extreme inclement weather. This is mainly due to the excessive rainfall resulting in flooded habitats and environments, thereby reducing food sources and shelter over prolonged periods, and more wind storms than usual wiping out early nesters. Together with ever changing climate patterns, all of these factors have made real inroads into bird and wildlife numbers, pretty well over all continents.

It is our duty to do all we can to protect, help and regenerate our environment for wildlife. Let's hope the migrant numbers will be better this year, and the dawn choruses stronger. To assist in identifying and aiding songbirds: www.songbird-survival.org.uk is a useful source.

Gardening in the merry month of May - Sowing Sue

In Capability Charlotte's temporary absence (she'll be back in June), I thought I might offer my own experiences in a May garden. Things are growing at a rate of knots, especially ground elder and couch grass - the latter ably abetted in my garden by an apparently Giant Mole, throwing up mountains of soil in my borders and enabling the couch grass to spread with ease. I have often wondered if this is a deliberate strategy by the GM - perhaps it eats couch grass roots as well as every worm my garden possesses. I generally spend my time in May fighting a rearguard action against weeds everywhere, especially in the flower borders, and wondering why they are so successful when my carefully nurtured plants frequently turn up their toes.

So why do I garden? Well, there is the honeysuckle scenting the air in May, and the roses (those that survive the Wiltshire blackspot), the iris sibirica in full bloom, and the bees and butterflies zooming around the long grass patches I have persuaded Him Indoors to allow to grow every year. Our bluebells and lilacs are already out, as is the apple blossom. There are a hundred different shades of fresh bright green, dotted with blues and yellows. It all feels rather hopeful, especially when the sun is out and you are sowing seeds that might survive and grow into summer plants. But then gardening is a thing of hope, and sometimes, just sometimes, it all works out the way you planned. Or nature surprises you with a design of its own.

This month, I shall hopefully be: planting out peas, sowing runner and French beans, sowing cucumbers and courgettes under cover, pricking out and potting on tomatoes and peppers, pricking out lettuce, planting out beetroot clumps a la No Dig, hardening off dahlias, pricking out summer flowers, sowing a cutting patch.....and, you never know, maybe even sitting out on a warmer evening with a glass of Noilly Prat and just taking the garden in!





Successful Village Hall Initiatives Highlighted at AGM

West Lavington Village Hall held a very successful Annual Meeting in April, attended by representatives of village groups who use the Hall and the

local Police Community Support team, as well as representatives of the Parish Council and interested members of the public.

The Chair of the Village Hall Committee, Lorna Gough, outlined all the challenges and achievements of the past year. 'Since the start of 2023, the VH Committee realised the year would be one of consolidation and catch-up' Lorna explained. She reminded everyone of the impact of Covid still being felt and also that the Village Hall was a charity which needs to raise funds and requires volunteer support.

Highlights of the year:

Implemented regular, planned safety checks throughout the VH.

Regular electrical testing, PAT testing of our electrical equipment including the stage lighting.

- An asbestos report had to be commissioned.
- Fire checks and report which led to the checking/replacement of Emergency lights.
- Essential maintenance including to our gutters and drainage system.
- Licensing of the Hall had to be addressed and we now have the correct Premises Licence which determines what we can do in the Hall and deals with the sale of alcohol. The Hall now has a Designated Premises Supervisor.
- Loos were given attention with new loo seats and long-expired batteries changed to ensure the water flushing functions were working in the male toilets.
- Seating and heating were highlighted as our priorities for 2024, as the Hall had lost bookings over hard seats and cold meetings!

During the year approximately 350 bookings were made, and it is encouraging that figure is already approaching 400 in 2024. "Without exception the hirers have been a pleasure to deal with, and happy with the facilities. We find the personal touch, via email, is what hirers tend to prefer and what works best" said Lorna. "Our regular hirers are very much appreciated."

New comfortable, colourful seats: The Parish Council kindly enabled the Hall to replace 150 chairs for which the Committee is very grateful. This has made seating comfier for hirers and gives the Hall flexibility to enable the old chairs to be used outside for fetes etc.

In addition a radio mic has just been purchased to make things easier to hear at meetings.

Theatre returns to the Village Hall: Theatre has made a return to the Village Hall after an absence of many years. Youngsters from the Chippenham Youth Theatre performed their end of season Showcase to an audience of 100-plus parents and friends at the end of March.

New Wiltshire partnership to support unpaid carers

As part of its role in the Wiltshire Council and the Bath and North East Somerset, Swindon and Wiltshire Integrated Care Board (BSW ICB), Wiltshire Council has announced a new partnership to support unpaid carers in the county, which will replace its partnership with Carer Support Wiltshire. Age UK Wiltshire is working in a consortium called Carers Together Wiltshire with Community First, Alzheimer's Support, Wiltshire Service Users Network, Citizens Advice Wiltshire and Wessex Community Action and many more charities. They will provide respite and a range of support to adult unpaid carers from the age of 18. This will include training, carer cafes and awareness raising in the community for unpaid carers. They will also work closely with Wiltshire Council to continue conducting carers' assessments.

Community First has been awarded the contract for younger adult and young carers from ages 5 to 25, focusing on support in primary schools. They will also support Wiltshire Council with their work with secondary schools and colleges to help young carers to understand their rights and what support is available to them.

Both providers will work together to support carers aged 18 - 25 and family support including parent carers. There is also investment in online support so carers can access training, chats, helpful guides and support at any time.

There will continue to be a Wiltshire Carer Card which will provide unpaid carers with ID as a carer and record emergency contact details. This will be available as a physical card and a digital app for people's smartphone, if preferred. Unpaid carers can continue to use the emergency card they already have while they wait for the new card.

Changes at Carer Support Wiltshire

As an independent charity, we have been providing services for unpaid carers for more than ten years in Wiltshire. Some of those were funded through charitable donations, and others, such as carers' assessments and the Carers' Emergency card, were services funded by Wiltshire Council. However, from 1 April we are no longer providing services on behalf of Wiltshire Council and will instead focus on providing services that you have told us you want and value. This change will give us greater flexibility to work with you on providing the services you've told us you need in our recent surveys and conferences.

We will continue to support carers in Wiltshire in the following ways:

A Message from Cllr Dominic Muns Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons

Politics... I despise it at times; most of the time in fact. It often leads to what James O'Brien (LBC presenter) calls 'footballification', where people offer blind support to anyone on the same 'team'. I am regularly frustrated by footballification in local politics where those working hard for their community are abused because they happen to have a party membership card gathering dust in a drawer somewhere. Some people need to stop thinking like a football hooligan and look at the individual and their efforts.

Over the last few years I have had cause to shake my head at a great many MPs who have brought politics into disrepute due to complete stupidity or disregard for morals. I work very hard for residents across five parishes and I refuse to be tarred with the same brush as bad politicians, whatever colour they wear.

I have helped many residents over the last few months with a huge range of problems in line with my role as your local councillor. Following the recent flooding (the worst being in Easterton and West Lavington), I was able to co-ordinate street sweepers and clean-up crews and advised residents and landowners on how they can work pre-emptively to minimise future risks of flooding. I have also been lobbying for additional spend on gulley clearance, culvert repairs and other maintenance tasks with success, and we will see more money spent as a result.

I spend hours each week assisting residents with planning applications, either defending against harmful ones, supporting beneficial ones or simply advising parish councils and residents on the complexities each application brings. Specific local issues recently include a 200-acre solar farm, a traveller site, a residential and commercial development, and applications outside the settlement boundary. My recent focus also includes planning enforcement which seeks to ensure that everyone follows the rules and nobody tries to cheat the community by building without consent, or ignoring important conditions. It isn't an easy topic because pragmatism is required, but I am also lobbying for "more teeth" to dissuade contraventions rather than just dealing with the consequences.

I have also been supporting residents with community projects across the area, from orchards to bus service improvements, playparks to road safety initiatives. As well as community matters, I regularly speak to residents on issues that are more personal and I have helped people obtain blue badges, education support, taxi licences and improved care packages, amongst many other things. I have also taken housing associations to task when they have failed in their duties to protect residents and I continue to challenge Wiltshire Police to better support residents on matters of speeding and anti-social behaviour.

Through all of this hard work I have not once been asked about, nor highlighted, my political affiliations. *I am just me working hard to support you*. For me, party politics can stay in Westminster.

Cllr Muns has raised the issue of the overgrown path from the main road down towards the school and Pavilion with the Highways team at Wiltshire Council and an officer is due to visit the area to see what can be done to improve the situation.

A successful litter pick has been completed by Councillors and village volunteers – thank you to all those who gave their time on a (mostly) sunny Sunday morning. Several bags of rubbish were collected.

The Parish Council adopted the end of year accounts 2023/24 and the audit is due to be completed shortly. As usual, plans will be in place for anyone to view the accounts during the summer.

The Annual Parish Meeting (APM) will take place on **Monday 13th May at 7.30pm in the Pavilion.** This is not a Parish Council meeting but a meeting for parishioners to come along and tell us about their year and give their views on any subject. There will be cheese and wine available. This will be followed by the Annual Council Meeting (ACM) where a Chairman and Vice-Chairman will be elected for the coming year.

Our villages need a Flood Warden: could that be you? Flood Wardens share out Parish resources like sandbags and road signs; warn residents at risk when weather warnings are issued; co-ordinate our responses with Wiltshire Councils Flood Team; and liaise with neighbouring village Flood Teams to warn residents of road closures and hazards. We would like someone independent, who lives in West Lavington or Littleton Panell and can give 30 minutes a week to help Councillors who run our emergency plan to manage flood risk and recovery. Please let us know if you are interested, using the contact details above.

Lavington Lane crossing: The road at the entrance to the Hayfield site was due to have a pedestrian crossing added during the schools Easter break. This work had to be postponed by Wiltshire Council and the Developer due to changes in the materials being used. The Parish Council has written to both, to ask them to set the new date during half term week at the end of May to avoid disrupted access to Lavington school. We had not had a reply when News and Views went to press.

West Lavington Posts: Our village is a welcoming and friendly community. On Facebook, West Lavington Posts is the place for finding out about our village events, and experiences of our community. My request to all that use it is, be kind. There have been two or three posts recently that have been quite cruel and directed at individuals. This is not representative of our community, so please think before you type, be factual and courteous. Thank you.



Our post-Easter break was cut short. Something came up that necessitated my wife and I returning home a day early. Don't worry, nothing bad happened. On the contrary. We had booked a week in the lovely Herefordshire village of Eardisley. The original intention had been to arrive on Easter Monday and stay until Saturday. But that's not how it worked out. After the reservation was made it was announced that Paul Weller was due to perform

at the newly refurbished Bristol Beacon on the Friday evening. Hence the change of plans.

I've been a fan of Weller ever since I was a teenager and he fronted The Jam, followed by The Style Council, and then as a solo artist. He has a new album out this month, called '66' (his age this year, apparently). At the Bristol gig Weller played a variety of old and new songs, including the first single to be released from 66, 'Soul Wandering'. It's an intriguing track, full of spiritual yearning. Weller sings, 'I want to believe in something greater than me'. You'll find it on YouTube if you fancy a listen.

It seems that even being a successful rock musician has not satisfied the singer's soul. The idea of believing in 'something greater than me' put me in mind of the teachings of Anselm (1033-1109 AD), the great medieval Archbishop of Canterbury. His writings are an expression of faith, seeking a deeper understanding of God and his ways. The theologian proposed that God is, "something-than-which-nothing-greater-can-be-thought". He is a perfect being, without flaw or creaturely limitations.

But how could such a God be known that we may believe in him? The Christian faith teaches that God has revealed himself to us through the universe he created by his powerful Word. The world we encounter each day speaks to us of the wisdom, power and goodness of our Creator. Further, God reveals himself by his written Word, the Bible. The pages of Scripture disclose God's matchless being, mighty acts and righteous laws. Above all, God has revealed himself to us by the Living Word he sent into the world, Jesus Christ, and through the Holy Spirit he has poured out upon his people.

According to the Bible we are lost and wandering, far from God, due to sin. Jesus came to bring us back to God by laying down his life for our sins on the cross. Are you also longing to believe in, 'something greater than me'? Your wandering soul will find rest in returning to the one God who is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. There is none greater.




